1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Royal Zoological Society of South Australia Incorporated (the "Society") is an incorporated association domiciled in South Australia. The address of the Society's registered office is Frome Road, Adelaide, South Australia. The Society is involved in the operation of the Adelaide Zoo and Monarto Zoo and is involved in a wide range of Conservation Programs both in Australia and internationally.

This financial report was authorised for issue by the Board on 23 December, 2010.

(a) Statement of compliance

The financial report is a general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, (including Australian Interpretation) adopted by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ("AASB") and the Associations Incorporation Act 1985 (as amended).

(b) Basis of Preparation

The financial report is presented in Australian dollars, which is the functional currency of the Society.

The financial report is prepared on the historical cost basis except that available for sale investments are stated at their fair value. Other non-current assets are stated at the lower of carrying amount and depreciated replacement cost.

The preparation of a financial report in conformity with Australian Accounting Standards requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making the judgements about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. Actual results may differ from these estimates. In particular, information about significant areas of estimation uncertainty and critical judgements in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effect on the amount recognised in the financial statements are described in the following notes:

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in the financial report.

Going concern

In December 2010 RZZSA renewed its Finance Facility Agreement with its principal banker, Westpac Banking Corporation. This Agreement extended current working capital facilities including the Bank Overdraft and the Term Debt Facility for a further 12 months to December 2011. These facilities are subject to quarterly review including measurement of the banking covenants guidelines set out in the Agreement. Under the terms of Finance Facility Agreement in place for the year to 30 June 2010 the Interest Cover covenant as defined in the Agreement was a minimum of 1.5. At 31 March 2010, and 30 June 2010 this was not met. Westpac Banking Corporation has confirmed its support with the Facility Agreement renewed in December 2010.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2010

Over the past 2 years RZZSA has invested significantly in bringing Pandas to the Adelaide Zoo, the exhibit for Pandas and the upgrade to key facilities at Adelaide Zoo including the front entrance. This investment was funded partly through Government Grants and debt funding and was predicated on a business plan prepared by RZSSA that indicated the organisation could support this level of debt through increased admissions income and other revenue opportunities. The upgrade programme was completed on time and to budget. Since completing these works and the arrival of the Pandas income has increased significantly. Projected forecasts prepared by management of RZZSA from July 2010 to December 2011 indicate that it can service the debt levels shown in the Balance Sheet in accordance with the terms of the Finance Facility Agreement signed with Westpac, together with the ongoing operating cash flow requirements of the Zoos.

(c) Revenue

(i) Donations, Bequests & Sponsorship

Donations, bequests and sponsorship made to the Society, including those made for specific purposes, are treated as income in the year received. Notwithstanding this, the Society applies specific purpose donations, bequests and sponsorship in accordance with the terms of the bequest and or the wishes of the donors/sponsor.

(ii) Membership Subscriptions

Membership subscriptions are recognised as revenue when earned rather than when the cash is received. Prepaid subscriptions are recorded as unearned revenue and are included in Sundry Creditors.

(iii) Interest & Dividends

Interest is recognised on an accruals basis. Dividends are brought to account as they are received.

(iv) Sales Revenue

Income from Admissions, Education, Catering and Retail are recognised as revenue when earned rather than when received.

(v) Grants

Grants received from government and other bodies are brought to account as income in the year in which they are received, unless they are for a specific purpose where costs have not yet been incurred. Grants in which the Society is required to repay unutilised funding are treated as reciprocal transfers and income is recognised by reference to the stage of completion.

(d) Receivables

Receivables to be settled within 60 days are carried at amortised cost. The Society is not materially exposed to any individual customer. The collectability of debts is assessed at year-end. (see accounting policy (i))

(e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and call deposits.

(f) Investments

The Society has a portfolio of investments ranging from cash at call to interest bearing or dividend yielding securities. The Investment Committee manages the portfolio to minimise the exposure to significant risk because of changes in yields or market values.

Investments in equity securities are held directly, classified as being available-for-sale, and stated at fair value. Any resultant gain or loss is recognised directly in equity, except for impairment losses.

The fair value of investments held as available-for-sale is their quoted bid price at the balance sheet date.

If the cumulative loss recognised directly in equity in relation to any investment is considered to be due to impairment, that cumulative loss is recognised in the income statement. When investments are derecognised, as a result of sale, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognised directly in equity is transferred to the income statement.

Investments are recognised/derecognised by the Society on the date it commits to purchase/sell the investments.

(g) Life Members Fund

The Society has established a Life Members Fund consisting of subscriptions received for life membership. The purpose of the fund is to allow the life members subscriptions to be used to fund specific capital projects at either Adelaide Zoo or Monarto Zoo. The Fund holds a portfolio of share investments. The Investment Committee manages the portfolio to minimise the exposure to significant risk because of changes in yields or market values.

Investments in shares purchased by the Fund are carried at fair value (see accounting policy (f)).

(h) Inventories

Inventories are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value. The cost of inventories is based on the first in first out principle, and includes the expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories, and bringing them into their existing location and condition.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the estimated selling expenses.

(i) Impairment

Non-Financial Assets

The carrying amounts of the Society's assets other than inventories (see accounting policy (h)) are reviewed at each balance sheet date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, the asset's recoverable amount is estimated (see accountancy policy (i)(i)).

An impairment loss is recognised whenever the carrying amount of an asset or its cash-generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement, unless an asset has previously been revalued, in which case the impairment loss is recognised as a reversal to the extent of that previous revaluation with any excess recognised through profit or loss.

Financial Assets

When a decline in the fair value of an available-for-sale financial asset, being the investment assets, has been recognised directly in equity and there is objective evidence that the asset is impaired, the cumulative loss that had been recognised directly in equity is recognised in profit or loss even though the financial asset has not been derecognised. The amount of the cumulative loss that is recognised in profit or loss is the difference between the acquisition cost and current fair value, less any impairment loss on that financial asset previously recognised in the profit or loss.

(i) Calculation of recoverable amount

The recoverable amount of the Society's receivables carried at amortised cost is calculated as the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the original effective interest rate (i.e., the effective interest rate computed at initial recognition of these financial assets). Receivables with a short duration are not discounted.

The recoverable amount of other assets is the greater of their net selling price and value in use. In the case of non-current asset of a not-for-profit entity, "value in use" means "depreciated replacement cost" of an asset when the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent on the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and where the entity would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits.

Depreciated replacement cost is defined as the current replacement cost of an asset less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation calculated on the basis of such cost to reflect the already consumed or expired future economic benefits of the asset. The current replacement cost of an asset is its cost measured by reference to the lowest cost at which the gross future economic benefits of that asset could currently be obtained in the normal course of business.

(ii) Reversals of impairment

An impairment loss in respect of receivables carried at amortised cost is reversed if the subsequent increase in recoverable amount can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss was recognised.

In respect of other assets, an impairment loss is reversed if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the recoverable amount. An impairment loss is reversed only to the extent that the asset's carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortisation, if no impairment loss had been recognised.

Impairment losses recognised in the profit or loss for an investment in an equity instrument classified as available-for-sale, shall not be reversed through the profit or loss.

(j) Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation (see below) and impairment losses (see accounting policy (i)). Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. The cost of self-constructed assets includes the cost of materials and direct labour, any other costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to a working condition for its intended use, and the costs of dismantling and removing the items and restoring the site on which they are located. Borrowing costs related to the acquisition and construction of qualifying assets are capitalised as part of the cost of the asset.

Where parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, they are accounted for as separate items of property, plant and equipment.

Assets donated to the Society are initially valued at fair value, being the amount for which the assets would be exchanged in an arm's length transaction. The asset value is determined by an independent valuation.

Gains and losses on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment are determined by comparing the proceeds from disposal with the carrying amount of property, plant and equipment and are recognised on a net basis in profit or loss.

The cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognised in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the Society and its cost can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised. The cost of the day-to-day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

Depreciation is charged to income statement on a straight line basis based on the following depreciation rates:

Buildings

2.5%

Exhibits

3.3% - 5.0%

Plant & Equipment

20.0% - 30.0%

Motor Vehicles

20.0%

Land is not depreciated.

(k) Creditors

Liabilities are recognised for amounts to be paid in future for goods or services received up to balance date. Creditors are normally settled within 30 days.

(l) Employee Benefits

(i) Long-term service benefits

The Society's net obligation in respect of long-term service benefits, is the amount of future benefit that employees have earned in return for their service in the current and prior periods. The obligation is discounted to its present value and the fair value of any related assets is deducted. The discount rate is the yield at the balance sheet date on government bonds that have maturity dates approximating the terms of the Society's obligations.

(ii) Wages, salaries and annual leave

Liabilities for wages, salaries and annual leave that are expected to be settled within 12 months of reporting date, represent present obligations resulting from employees' services provided to reporting date and are measured as the undiscounted amounts based on wage and salary rates that the Society expects to pay as at reporting date including related on-costs.

(m) Exhibit Acquisition and Transfer

Management of animal populations and a strong commitment to captive breeding of endangered species requires the Society to regularly interchange specimens with other approved zoos around the world. While threatened species and species subject to cooperative management plans are given freely for the benefit of conservation, the Society bears the cost of importing such species. As the acquisitions improve the quality of the exhibits, major costs are capitalised to property, plant and equipment in accordance with Note 1(j).

(n) Taxation

The Society is exempt from income tax under the current provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act. Accordingly there is no income tax expense or income tax payable.

(o) Operating lease payments

Payments made under operating leases are recognised in the income statement on a straightline basis over the term of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised in the income statement as an integral part of the total lease expense.

(p) Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as a current asset or liability in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the Australian Taxation Office are classified as operating cash flows.

(q) Application of Surplus

Any surplus generated by the Society is applied to the development of Adelaide and Monarto Zoos and in future Warrawong Sanctuary.

(r) Segment Information

The Society is involved in maintaining three zoological parks, being Adelaide and Monarto Zoos and in future Warrawong Sanctuary.

3. GOVERNMENT GRANTS

The South Australian Government provided general funding of \$3,126,000 (2009: \$3,126,000) during the year for capital and operating purposes. Other Government Grants totalling \$1,304,005 received are provided for specific projects carried out by the Society. During the year all general funding received has been recognised as income. The remaining specific purpose funding has been recognised in accordance with the various funding agreements. At 30 June 2010, the remaining \$11,201,000 of the \$18,900,000 grant from the South Australian Government for the predominant purpose of constructing a new Adelaide Zoo entrance has been recognised as income. The recognition reflects the completion of the project.

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The bank overdraft and interchangeable facility are secured by a First Registered Charge (Mortgage Debenture) over all the assets and undertakings of the Society. The facility is subject to an annual review. The loans and overdraft bear interest at the Banks reference rate plus margin, plus 4% p.a. payable monthly. The Commercial Bills drawn at 30 June 2010, include \$10,253 of GST financed by and repayable to Westpac on lodgement of the September quarter Business Activity Statement.

At 30 June 2010, the Finance Facility with Westpac was due to be repaid to Westpac Banking Corporation on 30th November 2010.

Subsequent to year end RZSSA has entered into a new Finance Facility Agreement with its principal banker, Westpac Banking Corporation. This Agreement extended current working capital facilities including the Bank Overdraft and the Term Debt Facility for a further 12 months to December 2011.

12. ACQUISITION OF BUSINESS COMBINATION

On 30 June 2010, the Society obtained control of the Warrawong Sanctuary business, which is primarily focussed on native species conservation, but also includes café/restaurant, overnight accommodation and retail operations.

The acquisition specifically related to purchase of the business and did not include the purchase of the land. The Society has entered into a long term leasing arrangement with the owner of the land.

Taking control of Warrawong will enable the Society to diversify its native species conservation and also apply its proven business practices to enhance the financial viability of the operation.

Given the acquisition on the last day of the financial year, the only items charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income Statement were minor charges associated with the settlement as no trading occurred until 1 July 2010.

Consideration was in the form of a cash settlement of \$219,216, with \$150,000 in vendor finance being extended, payable as \$100,000 in November 2010 and \$50,000 in March 2011, as disclosed separately as Other Loans – Secured on the Statement of Financial Position.

17. Financial Risk Management Objectives and Policies

The Society's activities expose it primarily to the financial risks in credit, liquidity and interest rates. The Society holds a relatively minor parcel of financial instruments for long term investment and is therefore subject to market risks.

The Society's financial assets consist mainly of cash and short term bank secured investments, trade and other receivables and some investments in listed Corporations. The Society's financial liabilities comprise trade and other payables. The main purpose of these financial instruments is to invest surplus Society funds in order to maximise returns prior to further capital development, while not exposing the Society to a high level of risk.

The Board has established policies and procedures designed to establish controls and monitor these risks which require cash to be invested with banks to hold investments in blue chip stocks only. The Society's Finance Committee oversees how management monitors compliance with these policies.

a. Credit Risk Exposure

Credit Risk is the potential risk of financial loss resulting from the failure of a customer to meet their obligations to the Society on time and in full as contracted. It arises principally from the Society's receivables from clients. The Society predominantly trades in cash, and therefore receivables forms a relatively small proportion of transactions.

There was no movement in the allowance for impairment in respect of trade receivables during the year.

Management has established a credit policy under which new customers are analysed individually for credit worthiness before being offered standard credit terms, however the majority of debtors pay prior to delivery of service.

The Board limits its portfolio of available-for-sale investments exposure to credit risk by only investing in blue chip stocks and limits the extent of trading taking advantage of market opportunities and selling or purchasing in line with capital requirements.

b. Liquidity Risk

Liquidity Risk is the risk that the Society does not have sufficient resources to meet its obligations when they become due and payable, or will have to do so at excessive cost. The Society's policy is designed to ensure that there are sufficient funds to meet its obligations when due, under both normal and stressed conditions, without incurring unacceptable losses or risking damage to the Society's reputation.

In addition, the Society has access to the banking facilities in Note 10.
